The Answer is Blowing in the Wind

I am so angry...I am so sad...I am so angry...I am so sad. The death toll climbs — Covid, war, mass killings, violence in our streets. I have been on a pendulum of conversation swinging between "God's ways are higher than our ways" (meaning we are not supposed to understand what's going on, but there is a plan) and "I'm kind of mad at God for not doing anything to stop all the violence". It all seems too much to take in. Children murdered. Children killing. I am reminded of the stories that God has told us about ourselves since the very beginning. We point our fingers at each other. It doesn't have anything to do with me, we say. It's her fault. It's them. Am I my brother's keeper? (The answer to that is yes.) We disagree. I know we disagree. We spend our time arguing, drawing lines in the sand. We stand firm in our opinion, and we retreat to the safety of our comfort zones, leaving our brothers and sisters in their grief and devastation.

It might lead one to despair. It almost led me there, but then I remembered Pentecost. The celebration of the coming of the Holy Spirit. Some call it the birthday of the church, but it might be better described as the day the church learned to walk, to talk. The disciples were locked up and away in fear when the wind of the Spirit blew the doors and the walls down. People were given the gift of listening and hearing people that spoke different languages. We speak very different languages these days. We hurl angry words about each other at each other. God looks at us, with great sadness, I imagine, and gives us the gift of communication – of speaking in ways others can understand, of listening to voices foreign to us. What a gift of grace and hope for who we might become, for who we are meant to be. This Pentecost, lift up your head from despair. Come out of hiding. Feel the wind of the Spirit pushing you to save the children, to guide the children whatever it takes, that together, we might have a future built on the foundation of the love of God.

Interested in seeing the Cahaba Lilies?

The Berea Sunday School Class (and friends) are planning to drive down to Bibb County to see the beautiful and rare Cahaba



lilies on Tuesday, June 7. The group will leave the church at 4 p.m., carpooling and caravaning. Some (all?) of the group will stop for dinner on the way back. The group is inviting anyone who'd like to to join them on this field trip!

For those who don't know, the Cahaba lily is an aquatic flowering plant which grows only in Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina. A type of spiderlily, the Cahaba lily is noted for its three-inchwide white flowers. The lily requires swift-flowing water over rocks, lots of sun and is restricted to shoal areas. The rule of thumb for lily-lovers everywhere in the Birmingham metro area is that the lilies start appearing from Mother's Day to Father's Day. We only have a couple of weeks left to see them!

Music Notes 'midst Organ-izing

When we left off last month, Barry and company were doing all we could to get the year 2000 organ to be as good as possible. We had gotten its pipes into good shape courtesy of the magic wrought by Dr. Schwandt, along with able assistance from Brant Duddy and Jim Schmidt. Now comes the replacement console. When Sam and I, along with four of our organist buddies were on an "organ crawl" around the Philadelphia area in 2018, hosted by Mr. Duddy, he told us that there was just what we needed for St. Andrews nearby. So two weeks later, Sam and I hopped into cobalt blue van and headed north.



The following spring in the midst of Lent, ninety-year-old Brant, along with a little help from yours truly, started gutting the Austin console, part of which was 50 years old, and the rest 100. Actually, this oldest part was the same age as St. Andrews' old Austin's chest and pipes on which we would soon begin our work. This console was large enough to control the newer organ in the back, and old Austin in the front. We worked quickly in our three-week time frame, and had it up and going by our deadline, the fifth Sunday of Lent. It has all new innards, electrically and mechanically.

Nonetheless, we did everything in our power to make it look like an Austin organ from the 1920s on the outside. Brant even had some parts from some other old ones, which he kindly donated! I am very grateful for Mr. Duddy. He was an invaluable resource to us from the very first month that our organ at East Lake was playing. Brant Duddy's truly irreplaceable.

There will be more about him next month!
