

The Bell Tower Players return!

This fall, specifically September 29-October 2, the Bell Tower Players will present "The Hallelujah Girls," a hilarious comedy about a woman and her friends who are determined to turn a dilapidated, abandoned church into a fine day spa.

Music Notes 'midst Organ-izing

Before the pipes go onto their chests, Dr Schwandt has to voice them. Much work must be done on each individual pipe! Flue pipes, such as the ones you see from your place in the pew, are nothing but big and little whistles. Each must be adjusted for speed of speech, vowel sound (ah, oo, ee, uh, etc.), volume, tone color, just to name a few things. Then they all must be adjusted to match their neighbors (except in pitch!). Most organ keyboards in America have 61 keys, so there are 61 pipes in each rank (set) of pipes, one for each key. They range from eight feet long at low C to three inches at top C.



How do we go about doing all this? The raw or re-voiced ranks must go into a voicing room. Inside with the pipes and a human (voicer), is what is called a *voicing machine* (or jack). It consists of 1. a 61-note keyboard, 2. a chest with the appropriate sized hole for each pipe to sit on, 3. a wind source (blower) to generate the air, 4. a bellows (air reservoir) to make sure the air pressure remains the same no matter how many pipes are played, and 5. a rectifier to change AC to low voltage DC, along with an electrical relay to make sure air goes into the correct pipe when a certain key is pressed. Essentially, you now have a one-rank pipe organ. This "little organ" allows the voicer, in this case John Schwandt, to work on the pipes one at a time, and then all together.

I was able to put this all together from my "stash" of supplies from over the past 40 years! More next time, so "stay tuned."
