What is your favorite hymn? Mine changes periodically. For a long time, it was "How Firm a Foundation": "When through fiery trials thy pathways shall lie, my grace all sufficient shall be thy supply." Before that, I imagine it was "Amazing Grace": "Tis grace hath brought me safe thus far, and grace shall lead me home." I love swaying to "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms": "What have I to dread? What have I to fear? Leaning on the everlasting arms. I have blessed peace, with my Lord so near. Leaning on the everlasting arms." I love the big, powerful hymns—"Immortal, Invisible God Only Wise"—and the small quiet hymns—"Take My Hand, Precious Lord," and "This is My Father's World." Christmas hymns and the extravagant hymns that are filled joy—"Joy to the World" and "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee," to name a few. What is your favorite and why?

My current favorite hymn is "Great is Thy Faithfulness." I love the beauty and the power of this hymn. I love the reminder and assurance of God's providence. More often, however, I remember this hymn in a different way that causes me to both tremble and rejoice. I do not think that I will ever forget my mother, bed-ridden and suffering from Lewy Body Dementia, singing the one line, "All I have needed thy hand hath provided. Great is Thy Faithfulness, Lord unto me." As you might imagine, I wondered a good bit about the how and why of that. But the more I have dwelt on that memory, I am led to believe that God gives us opportunity, potential, possibility for us to work with, for us to draw strength and inspiration from, for us to use in our faith journey to live out our discipleship and embody the kingdom of God. God gives us what we need, even if it's not always what we want. We are given strength, courage, hope, and one another.

What has God placed in your hands? What has God given you to use, to share, to spend? In this month of November, when our country is invited to reflect on the bounty of good things we have received, our church is invited to reflect on stewardship. What has been placed in our hands, within our care? This building, this creation, these neighborhood children, these needs in our community, these ministries in the church. In reality, thanksgiving, gratitude, is not a seasonal expression for us as Christians, but a way of life. Our discipleship is in response to the grace and mercy we have received from God. What have you been given to give? How have you been blessed to be a blessing? How will you remember and give thanks?

Sing the song. Dwell on God's faithfulness. Pray on what you have been given—resources, time, love beyond imagining. How is God calling you to give back by investing in God's kingdom?
