Rather than simply telling someone we will pray for them (and faithfully doing so), could we visit them, sit with them, stand up for them through whatever they are going through? When we fast from those things that get in the way of our relationship with God .— food, social media, etc.— how can that take shape in the world? Can we fast from things that are harmful to the community, to the environment, as well? And when we give our tithes and our offerings, let us work to make sure that those gifts are used to support the things that matter to God .— increasing love of our neighbor, creating more just opportunities for all, and building a bigger table where all can find a welcome place.

On this challenging journey, may we choose to take the first step, again and again. May our souls find the rhythm of going deep within ourselves to find that quiet center and back out to join in joyful community. It is hard and frustrating to give up control, to give ourselves to God and for others, not knowing how to at times and not knowing how things will turn out. Let us trust in the God who made us and in whom we live and move and have our being, that all our efforts, all our steps, will be used for God's glory and for the reconciliation of the world.

We have 8 folks already on the list, but I made reservations for 10, so we can add two people if you decide you want to go with us. It will be fun! (Those who signed up: Don't forget I need \$20 from each of you to pay our deposit for Miss Mary's.)

May 21 – Looks like we also missed the rock and roll show at the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, but May brings another great one. The title is *Clyde's*, and the ASF website says this about it:

"Creating the perfect sandwich is the shared quest of the formerly incarcerated kitchen staff of Clyde's, a truck stop cafe. Even as the shop's mischievous owner tries to keep them under her thumb, the staffers are given purpose and permission to dream — finding that 'sometimes a hero is more than a sandwich.' From twotime Pulitzer Prize winner Lynn Nottage, this Tonynominated hit from Broadway is full of laughs and insights into what it means to find your purpose. *Clyde's* is produced in partnership with the Equal Justice Initiative and Arkansas Repertory Theatre."

Tickets are a bit more expensive than they once were. The best seats are \$64, but there are also seats for \$54, \$40, and \$25. Let me know which you want they're going fast! I need a commitment of \$20 for this, too, by **March 8** so all the tickets don't get away. There will also be a charge for the van, and lunch in Montgomery.
