We are soon to end this Lenten journey. It is Holy Week. We are tempted, always tempted, to jump to the end of the story, to read the last page of the book, to start planning for Easter and skip over Good Friday. But, we cannot learn the lessons, we cannot grasp the full impact of God's magnificent power unless we walk through the valley, unless we, too, rehearse the suffering. That is when we truly come to understand that love is more powerful than death every time, in every way. When we walk in these footsteps of Jesus every Lenten season, we begin to forge an unforgettable assurance in our mind and hearts that no matter the sorrow or the heartbreak, we are never alone. And that, in the end love always win. It may not be the way we wished that it had been, but we are transformed in the process of suffering love. We are broken and remolded again and again, growing closer to becoming the loving, healing presence in this world that God has created us to be.

I was reading a mystery novel and found, in this story of a woman about to embark on a journey that would take her away from all that was familiar, an Easter message:

"Leaving that which you love breaks your heart open. But you will find a jewel inside, and this precious jewel is the opening of your heart to all that is new, and all that is different, and it will be the making of you – if you allow it to be. It is like the fracture of a delicate blue egg, when the bird-chick is ready to face the world. Such a struggle, such a rent in the casing that has most protected the small creature; but look what awaits – the learning to fly, and the grand adventure of migration Yes, there is the risk of death, and the sorry promise of starvation, of exhaustion, but that struggle is unavoidable. For you, the mystery of departure awaits." "She had told her that in leaving everything most loved, Maisie would break her own heart. In fact, she could feel it now, this much wounded heart that she had worked so hard to protect from the dragon of her memories – that she had cradled gently so it might not be broken, again, by love was, as she waved and called out, being fractured by her own desire for something more, something different. [She had the] assurance that, in leaving, she would shatter this precious part of her to open it again – and in so doing, she would cast aside all fears and instead claim the colors and scents, the sounds and minds of other places that would fashion who she might now become, and fill her anew." But first, we must walk through the valley of denial, betrayal, and abandonment to truly understand the dynamic of a love undeserved, a love that knows no bounds, a love that asks for our undying commitment. 


Hey there, friends!

Music Kotes 'midst Organ-izing

The season of Easter, sometimes called Eastertide, of course, begins this Sunday when we celebrate our risen Lord! We sing *Christ, the Lord, Is Risen Today* and *The Day of Resurrection*. At our call to prayer, we'll all sing He is risen, He is risen, tell it out with joyful voice! The choir will sing two anthems of Mimi Jackson's, and Shelly Ann is planning to sing *I Know That My Redeemer Liveth*, from *Messiah*. The day is considered the most important feast day of the church year.

However, the feast goes on! Why is that? Well, we continue on in Eastertide through the Sunday of Pentecost. The name comes from the Greek *pentekoste*,



which means 50, five times ten (It has the similar prefix to our country's five-sided *Pentagon*). Why fifty days? The Bible tells that Jesus walked the earth for forty days prior to his ascension, followed by ten days of waiting for the coming of the Holy Spirit, hence the 50 days, Easter Sunday through Pentecost Sunday.

During that time the choir sings of doubting Thomas (O Sons and Daughters), the road to Emmaus (Day of Arising--dedicated to former Birmingham music critic, Nancy Raabe), and the familiar This Joyful Eastertide. There are also three new ones (for us) this year.

There is a setting of Savior, Like a Shepherd, Lead Us to go along with Psalm 23 on Easter 4, along with a beautiful new tune for Come My Way, My Truth, My Life, and the use of Hark, Ten Thousand Harps and Voices for the Sunday after Ascension. We conclude the season on Pentecost with the beloved 500-year-old anthem, If Ye Love Me, by Elizabethan composer, Thomas Tallis. It remains the most-sung anthem of any on this day!




