Are you glad it's all over and are looking forward to what's next, or are you missing the holiday seasons? Whether Thanksgiving and Christmas were about food and family and festivity, or about loneliness and want, it was a lot. So, what do we do when the radio stations go back to regular pop music, and the lights and the greenery are gone. Do we remember that in their absence, we are the ones who are called to sing the story, we are to be the light, we are to remind people of our everlasting covenant of grace and forgiveness with our God?

What a lot to think about and pray about. At the beginning of the year, I am reminded that I really only have this one precious moment and that there is so much to do in this moment. I am also reminded of this quote by Howard Thurman:

When the star in the sky is gone,

When the kings and the princes are home,

When the shepherds are back with their flocks,

The work of Christmas begins

To find the lost,

To heal the broken,

To feed the hungry,

To release the prisoner,

To rebuild the nations

To bring peace among the people,

To make music in the heart.
