In the middle of this month, on Valentine's Day, which falls on Ash Wednesday, we will again set our sights and our hearts on Easter. We long to fill ourselves with the joy of Easter, with the peace that passes all understanding, with a love that knows no bounds. But as yet we are far away. Easter tells of a love that is stronger than death, of a God whose love for each of us is greater than we can imagine and a with power shown in this world through the love and suffering of Jesus.

The season of Lent begins with sackcloth and ashes, with the acknowledgement and sadness that often we live our lives far away from that kind of love. We say no to the good things and yes to the bad things. We get distracted. We forget that we are named and claimed by the God of all creation. We settle again and again for being much less than Easter people.

This season we will focus on this familiar glorious hymn by Charles Wesley, the brother of John who unwittingly started what became the United Methodist Church. I invite you to read again the words printed above. Sing them, if you like. This will be our journey from our bent to sinning, to being changed from glory to glory until we are lost in wonder, love, and praise.

The ashes placed on our foreheads remind us that we are fragile and finite, but also the stuff of all creation, stardust no less. How will we choose to live our days in that knowledge? How will we see the light of glorious Easter in our future and bring it into our present days? There is a lot to deal with between here and there, a lot to go through, the valley of the shadow of many deaths – death to pride and judgment, injustice and apathy. Death to sin and oppression in all of its forms.
