Freed for Joyful Obedience

The season of Lent is often a time when we think about saying no to things—no to bad habits, no to things that distract us and pull us away from God. The week that I am writing this, the 10 Commandments in Exodus 20, is one of the lectionary scriptures. We often call these the "thou shalt nots" for short. We see them as rules that tell us how to say no to things that pull us away from our covenant with God and our relationship with one another. Or we see them as "have to's." Lent is certainly a time in our life of faith that calls us to slow down, to pay attention, to be self-reflective and turn away (repent) from those things not of God. While all of that is true, I wonder if this season we could turn these ideas on their head a bit. We could look at turning from saying no to saying yes.

I just finished reading Shonda Rhimes's (of *Grey's Anatomy* and *How to Get Away with Murder* fame) book, <u>The Year of Yes.</u> While I had a difficult time imagining much of where she was coming from—wealth, fame, being introverted—I did find several good points in her book about saying "Yes!" She talked about saying yes to being healthy, rather than saying no to "bad" food. She talked about saying yes to challenging conversations and experiences, instead of thinking of them as things she had to do. It made me wonder if we could do the same with our journey of faith. What would happen if we focused on saying yes to that journey, instead of feeling like our path to discipleship is full of "have tos" and no's?

The 10 Commandments are a good example. On the surface, it sounds like the Hebrews had simply gone from one type of servitude to another. They had longed so for freedom, only to be boxed by these rules once they finally got to be free. Turns out that God gave them those rules, not merely to keep them in line, but out of abundant love. Those rules were what enabled them to live a life of freedom rather than a life of chaos. These healthy rules created space for them to grow and thrive. They helped those wandering in the wilderness and us wandering in our modern-day wildernesses to relate to one another and to God in ways that build up rather than tear down. These rules become the basis for holy imagination that helped them and us to see how the world could be if we commit to these instructions.

It is the same with this faithful journey of Lent. May we continue to walk this path in the footsteps of Jesus, to say yes to all that discipleship asks of us, knowing that it is indeed this path that is the path to new life and redemption. Just say yes!

Christmastide and Epiphany, I continue to be so very thankful for so many things. One of those things here at East Lake, is the Wednesday morning Bible Study, at which Sally asked me to take the helm a few years ago. For a number of years prior to that, she'd asked me to sub for her when she was out of town, as well as when someone had a particular point of history he or she wished for clarification. I think y'all know how I love European (especially British) history, and also Biblical history and geography. We are still going over about how Galilee, where Jesus lived, was in northern Palestine, with Samaria south of it, and how Judea, where the Temple in Jerusalem, Bethany, and Bethlehem were, was even farther down.
