I love spring! I don't mind the cold. I love bundling up in front of a fire with a hot drink and a good book, but I am always excited with I see the first buds of spring, when the sky turns that lighter shade of blue, and there is a soft breeze in the air. It reminds me of second chances. That is what this Easter season is about in many ways – a new day, a new chance, renewed hope.

Two scripture verses come to mind that express the joy and new opportunities that come with the Easter season and springtime. The first is from Isaiah 43:19-21: "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. The wild beasts will honor me, the jackals and the ostriches, for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people, the people whom I formed for myself that they might declare my praise." The second verse comes from the gospel of John, chapter 14 verse 5: "I am the vine, you are the branches. We strengthen this connection through prayer and study and service. We draw strength and a love of living through this connection to God.

How can we give praise to God and bear fruit in our discipleship? I think about all of the things that springtime and Eastertide bring to the life of the church — like the church booth and Kid's Corner and the thrift store, all starting up in conjunction with the East Lake Farmers Market. You may wonder what these things have to do with new life and second chances, with bearing fruit and giving praise. All these involve community, new people right at our doorstep looking for friendly faces and welcome and belonging. All of these opportunities are great ways for us to connect, to reach out, to give the love back that God has given to us. It is what we do. It is who we are. These small ways to offer cold water, treats and crafts, and a good bargain are ways we let the community know that we are in the neighborhood for good. That we are here to spread the love of Jesus and remind them that they are loved more than they can possibly imagine.

Let us pray together that these opportunities that God gives us to spread hope and love as a means of praise will be fruitful. May each of us live out the second chance we have been given with joy.

Annual Confence is this month

Annual Conference this year will be May 28-31 at Asbury United Methodist in Shelby County. This year's special offering will go to programs that address food insecurity in the North Alabama Conference. The monies collected will be dispensed on a grant basis. We all know that East Lake UMC has numerous programs that help people in our community—senior market baskets, our diner (where else can seniors get a delicious meal for \$6?), the market, the drop-in center, Lunch with Our Neighbors, and snack bags. Let's give generously to the special offering, which will be collected through May 25. In the 9:00 service, please put your special giving in an envelope, and designate it "AC special offering." In the 11:00 service, place your special offering in the missions basket.

In addition, each church is asked to give two complete Cleaning Buckets to go to disaster-hit areas of the United States. We know that there have been numerous floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, etc. in the last few months. UMCOR is very specific about the contents, so we will need to bring *exactly what is on the list*. We will have slips of paper on the long table in front of the glass doors on the lawn side. This will help us not to get more than we need of any one thing. Take one or more, and bring that item or items as soon as you get it/them. If shopping is difficult for you, you can also give money for us to buy needed items. Designate it "Cleaning Buckets" on an envelope. Here is a list of items we need for each bucket:

• One five-gallon round bucket with lid (14.35" h x 12.19" w x 12.19" d)

Like paint buckets you can get at Lowe's, Home Depot, or Ace Hardware)

- One 32-64 oz. bottle liquid laundry detergent
- One 16–40 oz. bottle liquid concentrate household cleaner No spray cleaners
- One 16–34 oz. bottle liquid dish soap.
- One 4–8 oz. pump/aerosol spray air freshener (aerosol must have safety cap)
- One 4–14 oz. pump spray insect repellant (pack of 20 wipes also acceptable) (Pump spray bottles must have protective covers
- One scrub brush with or without handle
- 18 re-usable cleaning wipes NO shop cloths, terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels (Can be removed from packaging)
- Five scouring pads NO stainless steel, copper or pads with soap in them; can be removed from packaging
- 36–50 clothespins
- One 50–100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- 24 roll of HD black trash bags (12ml) 3945 gallon Can be removed from packaging
- Five N95 particulate respirator dust masks (1–3 mm thickness) (No surgical masks)
- Two pairs kitchen gloves (durable for multiple uses)
- One pair work gloves cotton with leather palm or all leather
