The Heart of Worship

This past Sunday began our summer Sundays of meeting in the chapel for both of our worship services. This move was made to save on the cost of cooling the large sanctuary during the hottest months in an effort to be good stewards of the gracious gifts we have been given for mission and ministry. It's a good move. It's perfectly understandable. Of course, it comes with some drawbacks. We won't get to hear the "playing of the merry organ" every Sunday. And we won't get the awe-filled feeling of simply walking in that majestic space. The chapel is beautiful in a different way. It is more intimate and more immanent. But, it is really different.

It occurred to me that this move might not be only practical, but also theological. What can this move teach us about how we live out our faith? Many of us are used to seeing the glorious windows every Sunday and experiencing the vast dwelling that invokes the Holy Spirit. Without these experiences, it seems that something is missing in our worship experience. I wonder how people who don't have access to that experience manage. How do they find ways to worship?

Perhaps we are to be the bearers of those experiences to those outside of that majestic space. What is the song that we sing in what we say and how we live our lives? How can we share the stories, the miracles, the parables of Jesus, like the stained glass windows do? How can we make them tangible and real for those who do not know? How can we express the awe and stillness of that space to others whose lives are filled with distractions? How do our lives and our actions express the power and beauty of the love of God? Can we embody that sense of worship in our absence from that room so that others, who may never enter that room, might come to know the presence of the living God?

Maybe this shift in space, this shift in perspective, can be a call from God that is about much more than saving money on utilities. Perhaps it is a call to boldly live out our faith as passionate disciples following the Holy Spirit outside of the walls of the sanctuary. While we will return to our worship space in the matter of a few months, may this experience encourage us to continue to share the heart of worship in all that we do wherever we are.


Here's to more people, more connections, and more opportunities this Summer!

Bell Tower Players get ambitious this summer!

Yes, this summer our resident theatre group will once again tackle a Shakespeare play, this year, one of his tragic history plays.



Director Andrew Duxbury describes it this way: "Richard II is a play about power. About its use, its misuse. About how it can easily be squandered and difficult to regain. About how seemingly minor and heedless decisions made by those with power can add together bit by bit until an avalanche of wrong decisions and ill-conceived attempts to restore balance ultimately undoes a king and a nation."

Rather than portray the characters and the setting as they might have appeared in Shakespeare's time, Dr. Duxbury brings them into the modern day, and the whole play takes place in a makeshift prison. He says, "We still read and perform Shakespeare after 400 years because he brilliantly wrote about the very essence of human nature in various situations, and that never really changes."

Performances will be August 7-10 and 14-17.


