And to make things even better, there will be **two different options for you to participate.** This new Bible Study will be offered both as a:


- 1. midweek study (Wednesday nights at 6pm beginning on 9/10)

To all who know and love my dad—this is for you.

He's asked me to "let everyone know what's going on and where I am" ——so here we go. About five months ago, Dad was officially diagnosed with both Alzheimer's and frontotemporal dementia (FTD). But those of us close to him have seen signs creeping in for about five years now. FTD, in particular, is a tricky one. It changes how a person behaves, reasons, and connects with others—often long before memory loss kicks in. Right now, he's experiencing a mix of mild to moderate symptoms (stages 1-3). Thankfully, he's getting every bit of care and treatment available, but as of now, there's no way to reverse these changes—just ways to make life a little better day by day.



We've just moved Dad into Somerby of Franklin, one of the best independent living communities we could find. And yes—it also has an excellent memory care unit onsite for when the time comes.

He would absolutely love to hear from you! One major hallmark of dementia is withdrawal—pulling away from social contact. So if you haven't heard from him in a while, please know it's not personal. It's part of this awful disease. But your texts, calls, or cards would mean the world to him.

He especially wanted to send love to all his people from Centre, Fort Payne, Rainsville, Vernon, East Lake, and Hoover. He misses you, he loves you, and if he could work Facebook right now, he'd be telling you himself.

Your prayers are appreciated. If Dad played a role in your life—whether as a friend, mentor, pastor, or just a kind soul—please consider reaching out. Even if he doesn't fully remember the conversation later, the feeling it gives him sticks around. And that joy is everything right now. [See Jim's address, page 4]
