Labor of Love

You will be reading this article right around the Labor Day holiday. As with many of our holidays we often gather with family and friends for good food and don't think too much about the meaning of the day. Labor Day is a celebration of improvements in working conditions for the common American worker. Great strides had been made to insure that jobs were not too physically or mentally taxing, not dangerous, not seven days a week. We have the labor unions to thank for a 40-hour work week and benefits such as paid time off, vacations, and sick leave. In other words, we take off and relax this holiday to celebrate working well.

It got me to thinking about the work God calls us to do. Too often we fear that God will call us to do something scary or too difficult or at least exhausting. Let us take a breath to remind us that God is the originator of rest and working well. Let's remember the creation story in the first chapter of Genesis, God took a break, after all of the good work, to rest. God commands that we do the same. We are called to find a balance between work and rest and play. When we stop to rest we are reminded that God is the one in control, not us, and that the world continues to turn without us. When we return to work, our good work, we are reminded that God is counting on us to continue to be partners in the building of the kingdom "on earth as it is in heaven."

I hope that you will look them over and see what fits you, what sparks joy, what fills you up, and come and be a part of that. Find a friend or two that might join you. The more, the merrier – more joyful, more abundant. May we be about the good work of the Kingdom and fully live in God's abundance.

On September 30 of this month, our senior group invites you to join us on a trip to the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute to see the exhibit entitled **Bound Together: Threads of Remembrance**. Their website describes it this way:

"Bound Together is a community art exhibit honoring Jefferson County's 30+ known lynching victims. The exhibit features mixed media works by local artists and community members and serves as the culminating showcase of The Jefferson County Memorial Quilt Project. Created to provide space for residents to reflect on central Alabama's history of racial violence, the project invites our community to remember, to confront, and to imagine a more just future."

We plan to have transportation for our group from the church to the museum. We will plan to leave the church at 9:30 so we can get there by the time the museum opens. After a couple of hours there, we will go have lunch at Niki's West.

The cost of the museum for those over 65 is \$13. For others it is \$15. There will probably be a minimal charge for transportation, and then, of cours, lunch.
